EDITORIAL

The 1997 Good News Unlimited *Daniel* Seminars with Dr Desmond Ford have come and gone, the good news is that every venue saw a greatly increased attendance for which we praise and thank God.

I attended the Melbourne Seminar, an enthusiastic audience of at least two hundred people re on hand to hear Dr Ford. The Melbourne Seminar concluded his 1997 Australian and New Zealand tour.

The organisers at the various seminars, noted that the audience was made up of a lot of younger folk, also many from the Adventist community, with the old 'Glacier View' veterans being rather thin on the ground.

This shows that the battle over the gospel is still going on in a number of churches. The Holy Spirit is still striving with the hearts of people to give them the assurance that their salvation is already complete in Christ. It is up to us as individuals to respond to his wonderful offer, by surrendering ourselves to him.

In Melbourne (as in most venues), the people got together in groups during the lunch break and shared with each other their experiences, knowledge, and their journey in the gospel.

There were a lot of questions concerning the understanding of their particular faith, at question time, from the people assembled. To one and all Dr Ford gave his understanding of each topic.

In the course of Dr Ford's talks on the book of *Daniel*, he explained that the antichrist in the New Testament has its origins in this book. 'You cannot understand the prophecy of the antichrist without *Daniel*. If you have this book you will not make the mistake that many

good people have made, who throw the pitchfork of antichrist at a particular denomination and say "It's them". It is unchristian, unhistorical, untheological and plain rubbish. To try and attach the antichrist to one single denomination is very wrong.'

The much larger than usual audiences went away at the conclusion of the seminar having enjoyed a period of 'strong meat' and from the looks on their faces, they were spiritually satisfied—some being heard to say 'See you again next year.'

Christian Trust Seminar '97 There's No Need To Worry Letters

Dear Friend

One of the things I recall quite clearly from my childhood, is Dolly our draught horse. She was large and splendidly proportioned. She was quiet—I could catch her and harness her myself. But how she could pull! She gave fullness of meaning to the concept of 'horsepower'. The symmetry of her hindquarters; the thickness and grace of her neck and shoulders. She was beautiful to watch, and how she loved her work! She would go at it with such brute relish; bending her huge frame forward in the collar. She would shame lesser specimens into more spirited labours. I loved Dolly and was sad when she died in retirement.

Of course Christ was much more familiar with beasts of burden. He may have even fashioned yokes for oxen in his carpenters shop. On his travels up and down the country he would have seen ploughmen, with oxen under rein, moving across the fields. It was a common spectacle no doubt.

Once Jesus spoke of yokes and burdens in a way that possibly surprised many people. 'Come unto me all you who are weary and burdened and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light.' (Matt. 11:28-30)

The remarkable thing about Jesus' invitation is that it offers rest by offering a yoke; it sets forth repose in the shouldering of a burden. What images would have sprung to the minds of those who first pondered Jesus' words! 'Take my yoke upon you' - plodding and straining up and down, sweat and dust in the pitiless sun - 'and you shall find rest ...' The very proposal seems contradictory.

But Christ knew what he was saying and meant what he said. His message was that it is not necessary to shrink away from the jostle and the press of life, to some sheltered crevice in order to find release. Instead, the authentic human experience is only realized in the furrow of duty, responsibility, industry and service; in the perspiration and grit of relationships with all the trial and demand they place on us. It was Christ who prayed: 'My prayer is not that you take them out of this world ...' (John 17:15) In his profound wisdom, God has decreed that the pathway of happiness lies not in escape from myriad burdens, rather, that fulfilment can only be known in intelligent acceptance of difficulty. Intelligence—because that is what Jesus called for, 'Take my yoke ... and learn of me.' He was confident that within himself there were resources sufficient for all humanity to claim and meet successfully, the challenge of existence.

'Learn of Me for I am gentle and humble ...' Many have scoffed at the supposed weakness in Christ. Nietzche bade us have the manhood to shun the meekness of Christ; to stand on our own two feet and fight blow for blow. But what is the manhood of Nietzche compared to that of Christ? In his defiance of evil and his quiet acceptance of God's ordering of things, Jesus displayed unmatched courage. It was not in some luxurious resort that Jesus lived and died, it was in a harsh and unforgiving land; overshadowed by the cross. Amid blood, tears and tough times he ministered peace, hope and healing to discouraged hearts. 'Learn of me,' he said 'and I will help you face the formidable with serenity; bravery and optimism.'

'My yoke is easy ...' As if to emphasise himself as the very secret of his own counsel, Jesus says that it is his yoke that makes the difference. The invitation is for *all* to come and share what is his. He claims that those who join with him in helping to carry the enormous burden of the world's tiredness, will find to their amazement, that the very load makes life easier.

Is your life hard? Is it too difficult? Do you wonder how you can keep up? Do you see nothing before you but a laborious staggering until at last you drop? Christ's word is for you. Says he, 'Come to me and share with me what you cannot possibly bear alone.' Innumerable people have discovered the surprising truth of Christ's claim.

May God give you *his* rest through his Son, Jesus.

What does it mean to trust the Lord? Does it mean moving along in life in a blissful ignorance, with an attitude that God will take care of everything? Perhaps that is what it means for some people, but that does not work for me.

First, trusting God means living by his commandments and believing his plans are best.

Second, trusting God means refusing to accept responsibility for the final outcome of things. A friend in Colorado was involved in high stakes negotiations a few weeks ago. He could not sleep and was obsessed with getting the results he wanted and needed. He heard Chuck Swindoll on the radio reminding his listeners 'God is in control.' He slept through the night and the deal came through better than he had hoped. Trusting God

does not mean refusing to accept responsibility or being lazy. It simply means the final outcome of our efforts can be left in God's hands. This allows us to relax and become even more effective in our work.

Third, trusting God frees us to be able to take risks. We are able to believe he is the author of our dreams and desires, encouraging us to 'go for it.' For years I have been guided by one great question - what would you attempt if you knew you could not fail?

Trusting God means he will love me whether I succeed or fail. Therefore, he will enable me to recover from failure and move onto other successes.

Reverencing God, enables me to keep things in proper perspective. It allows me to refuse to take myself too seriously. It also allows me to see that He controls my life and my company, also the marketplace. There is no corporate security left today. The good news is that spiritual security is as strong as ever

There's No Need To Worry!

Times of uncertainty remind us that yesterday offers assurance for tomorrow

Change doesn't come easily to most of us. But it's one reality we can all count on.

As with any change, success is not certain. What is almost certain is hat we'll make some mistakes and experience some headaches. But we'll also discover new and better ways of doing things.

Today we look forward in anticipation of what we have planned, we have hopes and dreams of what might happen. And fears. In a years time we will look back at what really happened. All this will be a memory. But right now its a time of uncertainty and some worry.

At such times we recall, but struggle with, Jesus' words recorded in the Gospel of Matthew: 'Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own.' (Matt. 6:34)

No problem with the last sentence! But not worry about tomorrow? When was the last time I did not worry about tomorrow?

All of us face worries and often those worries centre on the changes we face in life: changes in employment, family, location; health and lifestyle. Ours is an age of uncertainty. And uncertainty can be even more stressful than change itself. Yet our Saviour says we are not to worry. Did he know what he was talking about? Do we know what he was talking about? Jesus' admonition is neither uninformed nor outdated.

His point—which is made as part of his sermon from the Mount—is that life, with all its changes, challenges, triumphs and tragedies must be centred and focused on the One who gave it to us. He wants us to have faith in God, not worry unduly about our circumstances.

Having created us is God now going to desert us? Do we believe that he would do that? Or do we believe that he has our interests at heart, just as he does 'the birds of the air' and 'the lilies of the field'?

Jesus' message is to get our focus right. Either we reject God and go it alone—now there's a *real* cause for worry! Or we acknowledge him and trust him to walk with us.

'My soul is downcast within me,'

agonised the Psalmist to God. He went on, 'Therefore I will remember you' (Psalm 42:6), as if reassuring himself by recalling what his God had done for him in times past.

'The man who feeds his heart on the record of what God has done in the past, will never worry about the future', comments William Barclay of the passage in Matthew.

The very least we can say that God has done for us in the past is that he gave us life. No one else has done that for us! Even if we believe in only that expression and presence of God in our lives, why would we not seek his further involvement in our lives today?

By committing today to him in faith, by entrusting our lives to him, we build a past of God taking care of us—a past we can 'feed our hearts on' as Barclay says. In future times of distress or uncertainty we will be able to say, like the Psalmist, 'My soul is downcast but I will remember you.'

And when we can remember what God has done for us in the past we can entrust tomorrow to him as well, rather than worrying about it.

Q Please explain Paul's counsel to the Ephesians - 'to be filled with the Spirit.' Why say this to those



who presumably had already received the Spirit?

A While the baptism of the Spirit applies to the initial experience of conversion, the filling of Ephesians 5:18 applies to a continuous state of what Galations calls 'walking in the Spirit.' (See Galations 5:16) It means being aware of our privileges as sons and daughters of God and living accordingly - in an attitude of constant dependence on the guidance and power of the Spirit. In Acts, nearly a score of times, we read of believers beng filled with the Spirit and often

there it applies to a fresh energising at a time of spiritual revival. Ephesians 5:18 more likely refers to the normal privilege of every believer who is constantly looking unto Jesus. Observe that the parallel passage in Colossians 3:16 speaks of being filled with the word. Those who in prayerful dependence upon God, endeavour to live by the Word, always have the indwelling of the Spirit.

Q Does not Acts 19:1-6 clearly demonstrate that it is possible to be a believer and still not be baptised in the Spirit?

A It would be quite wrong to take this passage as the norm for Christians. These disciples were disciples of John, who knew little of Je-

sus. When Paul brought them up to date with the gospel, they were baptised both with water and the Spirit. While it is true that many Christians at the time of water baptism, are not aware of the fullness of their privileges and often enter into spiritual maturity at a later date, such is not God's ideal any more than it was his original plan for Israel to wander forty years in the wilderness. 1Corinthians 12:13 clearly affirms that all who become Christians, thereby are baptised by the Spirit into the body of Christ.



Let me start with a brief family background. My father and his family were all members of Southern Baptist churches. My mother's family also was predominantly Baptist. In my opinion most Southern Baptist churches do a wonderful job of emphasizing the Gospel in all their services. If it is not the meat of the service they'll summarise with a gospel presentation and give an alter call in virtually all services. It was in these churches where most of my family came to a saving relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ.

As a teenager, my mother joined the Seventh Day Adventist church. When I was born my family was split between Baptists and Adventists. My father was killed in a work related accident when I was ten. After his death I had little exposure to his side of the family.

I'll simply state for now, that I had a very difficult time while

growing up in my teen years, in hearing and learning the true answer for the most important question of all, 'What must I do to be saved?'

After attending church school I went on to the University of Arkansas at Little Rock and then in 1977 moved to Memphis, Tennessee to work on my doctorate degree in Optometry. It was during those years, where I was not so isolated, that I began visiting other churches, enjoying fellowship with other believers and learning more and more about the true Gospel of God's Grace.

From September 1981 to July 1984 I was in Germany serving as a Doctor of Optometry in an army hospital. After returning to the USA, (having been re-baptised into the Baptist Church) I joined Park Cities Baptist Church in Dallas, Texas, where I met my wonderful wife.

My wife and I now worship

in a nondenominational fellow-ship—Plano Bible Chapel in Plano, Texas. My Christian walk has never been stronger, happier, or more productive than it is now—some eighteen years after leaving the church of my mother. The assurance of my own salvation has energised me to boldly reach out to those who do not know Christ at all.

As I read the book of Galations I ask, 'If a person is trusting in anything in addition to the Grace of God for salvation, are they truly saved?'


