## **Editorial**

o you remember the day you heard the Gospel? The Holy Spirit opened your eyes and your heart, and as the wonder of what Jesus had done for you at Calvary began to dawn, you said, 'Yes Lord! I want to be part of this wonderful salvation you have won for me.'

There followed a time of repentance, when you put behind you your sinful life and moved into a new life of oneness with Jesus. The joy of it all and the assurance of eternal life has continued with you ever since. It is the basis of your life and you will testify of it to everyone who wants to hear it.

To the new Christian who has come in from the outside world, the Christian journey, as tough as it may be, is fairly straight forward. He is not encumbered with a past church culture which has determined much of his life-style. But for people who have been churchgoing Sabbath keepers for much of their lives, it can be a very difficult transition to a Gospel centered life-style.

When you have believed that the Sabbath is part of your salvation, like keeping the commandments (Rev. 12:17), the Seal of God (Rev. 7:3) with Sunday keeping being the 'mark of the Beast', as well as being the 'great distinguishing mark of the last days,' you can be excused for being confused as to where the Sabbath fits into a Gospel lifestyle.

We know that because we are sinners it is impossible for us to keep God's law, and as the Sabbath is part of his law, any attempt at keeping it is futile before we start. Part of Jesus' ministry while here on earth, was to keep the law for us and his keeping of the law, that is, his righteousness is imputed to us when we accept him by faith as our Lord and Saviour. Hence the term righteousness by faith. We also know that our salvation is solely the work of Christ himself, with us having no part in it at all. Therefore, our declaration of faith in him is the real 'Seal of God' and the real 'great distinguishing mark of the last days.'

So what part can the Sabbath play in the life of a Gospel Christian? It becomes part of that person's worship system, the same as Sunday is part of the worship system for the majority of Christians. Neither Sabbath or Sunday has anything to do with our salvation. Jesus won that for us by his death on Calvary's

cross. The forgiveness which flows from the greatest event in the history of the world, is



offered to us freely.

When we accept Jesus' forgiveness of our sins, our response to his great act of love is our worship.

Worship is not just what we do when we go to church. It is our whole of life response to what Christ has done for us. If part of your response is to use the principles of the Sabbath as the basis of your worship, then you are basing your worship on Jesus being both our Creator and our Redeemer. If, on the other hand, you use Sunday and its underlying principles, then you are acknowledging Jesus as Redeemer only, and may or may not acknowledge him as Creator.

We are free before God to develop our own worship systems—with the guiding of the Holy Spirit and the gifts he has given us. It is a matter of your personal tradition, culture and choice.

May God continue to lead you into the joy of his Gospel.

### **Dear Friend**

any times I have heard this rather silly saying: 'It doesn't mat ter what you believe, as long as you live right.' It's a remark that often attracts unfortunate applause from shallow thinking folk. A moments consideration would reveal its falsehood. In the long run, the way people think dictates the way they live. Ideas are the rulers of existence. This logic is implicit in 1 Corinthians 15, where Paul concludes that if there is no resurrection from the dead, then it would be best to try and squeeze every possible thrill from life—for tomorrow we die.



These days thinking is judged to be very poor work. Radio, television and cinema have combined to take the place of those robust gatherings of farmers and townsfolk in the village square, where the weightier matters of life were debated deliberately and soberly. Now, there is popular disparagement of such toilsome business as theology, and it has wrought mischief for the church and the world. It has made Christianity a collection of moods and feelings: an incoherent, spasmodic affair with little power to encourage strong faith in God.

Perhaps it has been a perceived assault on the Bible, by criticism and science that has encouraged so many to welcome the emphasis on experience. After all, what can science and criticism say to one who knows he has had a personal experience of God?

'A warmth within the breast would melt, The freezing reason's colder part, And like a man in wrath the heart Stood up and answered, I have felt.'

I have no doubt that there is a religious dimension in the human psyche which is God-given and with which we all, at one time or another, have genuine experiences of God. But there are real risks in putting subjective occurrences too much to the fore.

When faith looks for its authority to the witness from within, it may be far away from the New Testament. The religion of the Gospel is based on historical facts. The scripture above, asks us to remember those facts which constituted the apostolic faith. For Paul, the Gospel consisted of certain events which had happened in recent history and which were verifiable by eyewitnesses, namely, the life, death and rising again of Jesus. These events are the given facts of Christianity—they are objective.

They did not proceed from religious ecstasies; a revelation took place, God invaded human life. Our religion is not the result of human movement toward God, but of God's movement toward humans; not our witness about God, but of God's witness to himself through Jesus Christ. Jesus is God's word; the objective Gospel truth is his incarnation, death and resurrection. There may be many ways of thinking about these facts, but the facts remain the same for everyone.

It is for us to be thankful that the impregnable Rock on which faith can take its stand does not issue from anybody's inner consciousness. The spiritual thoughts and interior proceedings of human beings have often brought forth things beautiful and worthwhile. But they cannot be depended on to reveal the truth of God.

Experience needs ever to be weighed, tested and guided by what God has done in the history of Jesus. In that we can know God truly. Then, what we believe, will have its wholesome effect on our entire life. The truth of Christ's saying will be seen; 'You will know the truth and the truth will set you free.' (John 8:32)


Responsibility

Then suddenly they found themselves back in the attic with Sue still clutching the binoculars. The three of them stared at each other.


'Wow, do I feel great,' said Sue at last. 'I don't feel angry any more. It was meeting Jesus that made all the difference.'


'Come on,' said Craig.

WFP is the frontline United Nations Agency whose mission it is to provide: Food for LIFE to sustain victims of man-made and natural disasters; Food for GROWTH to improve the nutrition and quality of life of the most vulnerable people at critical times in their lives; and Food for WORK to help build assets and promote the self-reliance of poor people and communities, particularly through labour-intensive works programmes.

It has proven to be a marvellous means of helping the world's hungry.

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
