Hard Times, a Sign of the Times.

Denominations today in the Western World are having a tough time. We frequently hear how church attendances are falling and some church spokesmen will occasionally publicly deplore the lack of interest in worshipping God. But what is not said, is that with falling attendances has come a decline in church incomes.

In the heyday of church attendance-from 1850-1950- the generosity of the person in the pew enabled many denominations to build their 'flagship' institutions like schools, colleges, hospitals, nursing homes and other businesses. Whenever these institutions needed more capital to upgrade or expand, an appeal was made to the congregations, and the money was usually forth coming.

Today, most congregation struggle to pay their way, there is little over to provide capital for the 'flagship' institutions. Recently it was stated at the NSW Presbyterian Assembly, that the turnover of the congregation was eleven million dollars and the turnover of the institutions was fifty seven million.

With this large disparity in incomes, there is no way that the congregations can continue to provide the capital needed for the ongoing reinvestment programs of the church institutions. It is only a mat-

ter of time before they are sold offjust like Qantas, the Commonwealth Bank and Telstra.

Most denominations are going through the same problems. Although they say little publicly, one can, from time to time spot the signs. One such sign is the two letters from the Seventh-day Adventist Church administrators regarding the work of Dr Desmond Ford, mentioned in our last magazine. They have charged him with (amongst other things) open solicitation of tithe.

Most churches use the term 'tithes and offerings' to describe the income received in the church plate. But it is between God and the person concerned how much is set aside and how it is placed. A church has no right to demand it or expect it, and to lay this charge against a faithful and well known servant of God is quite preposterous.

Could it be that the finances of the SDA Church are so finely balanced and budgeted, that if a few of its members also support the work of Dr Ford, there will be financial problems within that denomination?

The financial problems of the denominations are but another sign of the times. A while ago I read a sermon by a minister of a church in the heart of New York. He said he was troubled by falling church attendance. 'It was,' he said 'God trimming his Church back to fighting weight.' Yes, the trend is to get leaner and more efficient. Parishes are getting bigger; ministers fewer, with more expected from them.

I believe God is leading his

Church back to where it was in the book of Acts, when there were just small groups led by lay-elders. Those tiny groups faced a pagan world-which was sometimes openly hostile to them. They had no colleges, hospitals or other 'flagship' businesses, all they had was the gospel to preach to a lost world.

Yet against great odds, those early Christians persevered. Under the power of the Holy Spirit, they preached the gospel very effectively and many were saved.

Yes, God is in the process of stripping his Church of all its excess baggage. He is slowly leading us back to our core business-the preaching of the gospel of salvation in the Lord Jesus Christ. Calling people to repentance in His name for the remission of their sin—as Des Ford has been training us to do for many years.

Although the decline of denominations is a sign of the times, one of the most important signs is Matthew 24:14 'And this gospel of the kingdom will be preached in all the world as a witness to all nations, and then will the end come.' This sign is not yet fulfilled, but God will see that it is fulfilled despite the decline of the denominations.

Let us put ourselves at God's disposal right now, so that he may hasten the day when this sign is brought to fulfillment

Focus on the Gospel

'For I am convinced that neither death nor life ... will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.' Romans 8:38-39

Dear Friend

What do men and women really seek for in religion? Someone has answered by saying they are searching for the certainty that there is a God and that he loves them. What could be a more compelling inducement to such a faith, than the existence of people who possess such certainty, and tell others of it.

One such person was Paul. Perhaps a braver and more splendid thing was never said of God than what we read in the closing lines of Romans eight. The assurance offered there is exactly of the kind to equip people for survival amid the bewilderment and shocks of life.

The implications of Paul's triumphant utterance, are, that persons clasped in the love of God are safe for time and eternity. A bold affirmation like this would never have come from Paul had he been thinking in terms of his own adequacies and strengths. Instead, he was inspired by the thought of God's mighty grasp of the world and its affairs—our security rests not on our knowledge of God, but his knowledge of us. Not on our love for him, but his love for us; not our choosing him, but his choosing us.

There are no grounds for optimism when the world and its destiny is seen as held in the hands of fickle people with all their conflicting ambitions. Hope takes root upon a faith in God, who is at the centre of things. Out temper varies constantly, being poor grounds for reliance. We have dark times when love for God grows cold. But he never stops loving us, and therein lies our safety. When Oliver Cromwell was dying, he spoke saying, 'Faith in the Covenant is my only support, and if I believe *not*, He abides faithful.'

Neither death nor life, says Paul. It seems odd to speak of death first. We would proceed from what we thought was the lesser to the greater threat. We would have thought that death was far more likely to separate us from God, than life. Not so, Paul. He spoke from the perspective of the Gospel in which death may separate us from our fellows, but never from God. And if we remain in God's keeping even in the face of death, naught that life shall be able to throw at us will sever us from him.

The last part of verse 39 says that this love is '... in *Christ Jesus our Lord*.' Only in the story of Christ do we learn of a love that will not let us go. Only in the light of the cross did Paul make his terrific statement.

'For Him who loves me now so well, What power my soul can sever? Shall life or death or earth or hell? No! I am his forever.'

May the love of God sustain you and give you hope. Yours in service

As Chesterton said, 'The one doctrine of the faith that needs no proof, is original sin.' From this mistake of Bob's, others flow.

The Jesus Seminar he approves is now rejected in its findings by top New Testament scholars around the world.

If you want personally to

read more on this, I can give you titles of the best scholars, but begin with Meiers' Marginal Jesus, which rejects the distinctive teachings of Bob and agrees on the minor, as I also do.

Gill was glad she had come to the homeopath. She didn't want Jasper on seizure medicine that would make him sleep all the time—not unless it was necessary.




There were many other questions that were very specific. Gill didn't know all the answers.

eter was a very special Christian. He was loyal without reserve to his God, his family, his church and his friends. He was an active church leader, a professor of chemistry at the University of Rockhampton, and with Jane and family, host of those who loved the gospel.

Peter and I spent many, many hours in fellowship—in his home, his office; on bicycles and walking, as well as in the many gospel meetings he chaired at the university while I spoke.

A man apparently free of vices, he overflowed with virtues. He was a good husband without peer—Jane to him was not just his spouse but his best friend and mate. Each of his children was equally precious to him and the object of intimate care and prayer. He was a respected father, engaging with, and encouraging his children in recreational, manual, spiritual and social activities. He was a very precious friend who could always be counted on.

Peter had no fear of death. He knew and loved the gospel (that we were all justified, died, and rose again in our Representative). He knew that we had been ruined without our participation, in the first Adam, but redeemed again without our participation, in the second Adam. He taught many in the church that we are saved by faith alone—though the faith that saves is never alone. Not by faith plus works, but by a faith that works, we receive salvation. He knew that the standing of every committed Christian was one hundred percent 'complete in Christ,' 'accepted in the Beloved,' though our state is never perfect.

'Higher than the highest human thought can reach is God's ideal for his children.' If our thoughts cannot reach that ideal, how much we always need (and receive) grace. Peter had the verdict of the last judgement as soon as he understood John 5:24 and Romans 3:19-31. He had eternal life that very moment.

Believers never say 'goodbye'

for the last time. We shall see and embrace him again. Meanwhile, our prayers mingle with our love for Jane and family, his brothers, sisters and other dear ones.

Beneath the Cross of Jesus

In his book, Beneath the Cross of Jesus, A. Leonard Griffith tells the story of a young Korean exchange student, a leader in Christian circles at the University of Pennsylvania. The student left his apartment one evening in April to mail a letter to his parents. As he turned from the mail-box, he was met by eleven leather-jacketed teenage boys. Without a word, they beat him with a blackjack, a lead pipe and their shoes and fists, leav-

ing him lying dead in the gutter. All of Philadelphia cried out for vengeance. The district attorney planned to seek the death penalty for the arrested youths. And then, the following letter arrived, signed by the boy's parents and twenty other relatives in Korea: 'Our family has met together and we have decided to petition that the most generous treatment possible, within the laws of your government be given to those who have committed this criminal action ... In order to give evidence of our sincere hope contained in this petition, we have decided to save money to start a fund to be used for the religious, educational, vocational and social guidance of the boys when they are released ... We have dared to express our hope with a spirit received from the gospel of our Saviour Jesus Christ who died for our sins.'

When you forgive, you are no longer a victim but a victor. To love and forgive is to set a prisoner free . . . and discover the prisoner was you!

You drive north from Sacremento on 1-5 as far as you can go-right to the Canadian border. Then you carefully scrutinize the instructions that have been given over the phone by Dan Ericson. You cross the border and drive ten miles. And there it is, about forty miles out of Vancouver, B C.

Were there many there?

For our GNU meetings, about forty gospel-believers, I didn't actually count. About the same as our Auburn Fellowship on a good day.

The meetings were held on a University campus?

Yes, a lovely campus, beautifully wooded. Trinity Western university is a privately funded Christian liberal arts university with 2,850 students this year. The campus is adjacent to Fort Langley, an historical landmark on the Fraser River.

What was your teaching topic?

I used some updated material on the Gospel of Luke from one of our GNU Bible Schools in Auburn.

There's a hymn I love by Frederick Faber, 'There's a Wideness in God's Mercy.' My reading of Luke is that God's mercy is wide indeed. 'For the love of God is broader than the measure of man's mind, and the heart of the Eternal is most wonderfully kind.'

Luke is inclusive. Not in the sense of teaching that everyone will be saved at last, rather, in the sense that what Christ did for us, he did for all. No one is excluded from the love of God in Christ. No one is outside the circle of salvation. Salvation is truly free, and there for the taking.

How was the trip itself?

I drove all the way, about 1,800 miles. Here in the USA, you have to drive all the time. In Australia, you can drive for miles without seeing another car. On 1-5 there was a car in front and a car behind and maybe a huge truck beside us all the way. No dozing!

Carmen stayed awake the whole trip. Once or twice she helped me avoid running over people walking on the highway

We loved the country. Mt. Shasta was awe-inspiring, also the cascades. The whole experience was very good.

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

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

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
